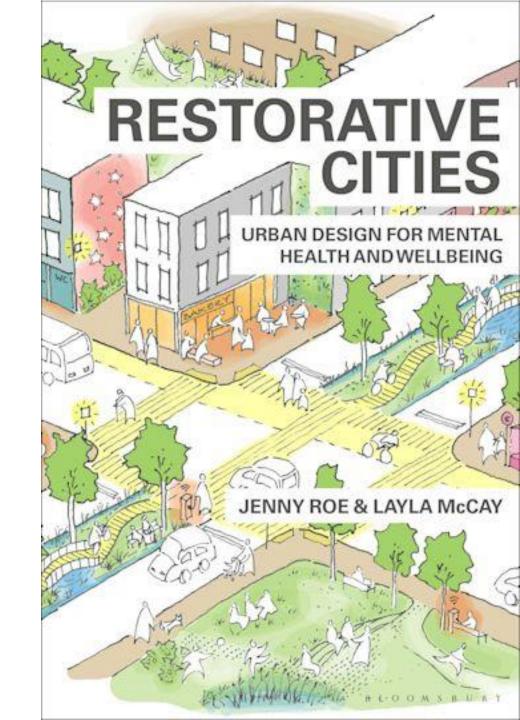

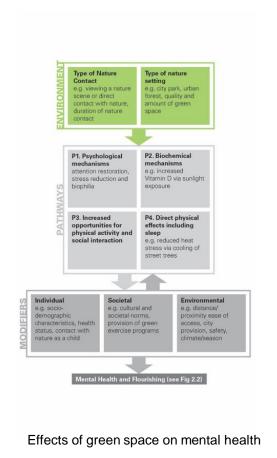

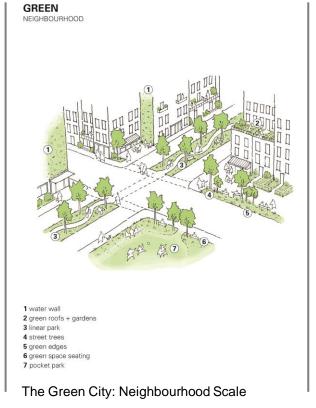
Restorative City Framework

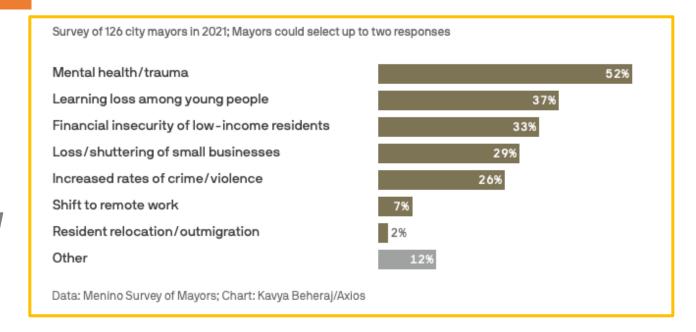
